#### **MIRROR EXERCISE**

Split into groups of two. Pick one person to be the mirror and the other to be the actor. The actor starts moving their body very slowly and the mirror follows their actions. See how closely you can match—then switch roles!

### **COSTUMING CHAOS**

Everyone has one minute to use anything they can find to create a costume and character. Then come back together and act out your new identities. Can you tell a story together with your characters?

## **ONE-WORD STORY**

Sit in a circle. The first person starts the game by saying, "Once." Then move around the circle with each person saying one word at a time to create a collaborative story. The game ends when someone says, "The," and it is followed by "End."

## **DUCK DUCK DANCE**


Still sitting in a circle, play this variation of the classic game "Duck, Duck, Goose." One person is cast as the Director and walks around the outside of the circle, tapping each person on the head and saying, "Duck." But for one player, instead of saying, "Duck," the Director says, "Dance!" The Dancer goes to the center of the circle and dances as sillily as they like, while the Director runs around the circle until they come back to that same spot and takes a seat. If the Dancer stops dancing before the Director gets a seat, they become the new Director! If the Dancer is still dancing, the Director plays their role again and the game continues.
