## FINDING MONTESSORI ACTIVITIES AND FURNITURE

We often get asked where we find the beautiful furniture, activities, and supplies in our classrooms and homes.

- 1. Look local—we love to support local businesses, and the eco footprint is much smaller than shopping online. Have a local woodworker build some shelves; retired neighbors may enjoy making patchwork balls and mobiles; and look for baskets at charity/thrift stores.
- 2. Buy secondhand—our homes do not need to look like a classroom or catalog; secondhand furniture and wooden toys can get a second life in our homes.
- 3. Use what we have—once we have learned about the Montessori approach, we look at things differently: We can repurpose a simple wooden box; we can use everyday items for exploration and language; some of our baby's favorite items may not be from a toy store, but from our kitchen cupboards.
- **4.** Keep our eyes open—we make wonderful discoveries in regular homewares stores. For example, a box to open and close, an item that has a nice noise or material to explore, or items that can be repurposed, such as a wooden mug holder in which Solu can place bangle bracelets.
- 5. That Swedish place—a few basics from places like IKEA mixed with other items allows us to work within a budget while maintaining our home's personal character. IKEA has some suitable low shelving, tables and chairs, and book ledges and hooks, as well as items for the kitchen and bathroom.
- **6.** Make items ourselves—babies master skills quickly, so rather than buying expensive wooden toys, we can create activities, like posting with a ping pong ball and shoebox.
- 7. Rent instead of buy, or share with like-minded families—search online parent groups for anyone interested in rotating or trading toys. We may be able to find a toy rental company that also has Montessori activities. At the end of the month, we can return the activities and receive new ones for our baby to try.
- **8.** Sign up for a subscription box—if our budget allows, consider a Montessori subscription box service like Monti Kids. These subscription services are not essential to being a Montessori family, but they do make finding Montessori activities easy.
