

DISCUSSION GUIDE

- 1. Why did Lucy's parents send her to Europe? Was it a gift? A bribe? Why does her father insist she study business? Why doesn't he trust her to make her own decisions?
- 2. During a family argument, Lucy's father says to her mother: "We're not her friends; we're her parents."

 But Lucy wonders, "Can't you be both?" (page 8).

 How would you answer Lucy's question? Can parents also be friends to their children? Should they be?

 Are yours?
- 3. How would you describe Charlene's relationship with Lucy? "We never weren't friends," Charlene tells Lucy in Florence (page 49). Do you agree? Why or why not? How does their relationship evolve over the course of the novel?
- 4. Why is Charlene so insistent about getting a room with a view in Florence? What is the practical advantage of such a room? What is the symbolic significance?
- 5. Why is Jesse in Europe? What is he looking for? What do his parents want for him? "I don't believe in making plans," he says (page 55), when he meets Lucy. Is that still true by the end of the novel?
- 6. "How could they go from being so in love one moment to wanting to kill each other the next?" Lucy wonders (page 81), when she sees a quarrel between lovers turn violent. Why are love and anger often two sides of the same coin?
- 7. Before Lucy has sex for the first time with Jesse in Rome, she wonders, "What if I'm not as ready as I think I am?" (page 101). Is she rushing into a sexual relationship? What risks is she taking? Why does she ignore them?
- 8. Why does Lucy immediately refuse Jesse's offer to stay with him in Florence? What does she realize about herself?

- 9. What role do men play in the rising tensions between Lucy and Charlene in Italy? Is Charlene justified in feeling abandoned by Lucy? Why does Charlene fear that she is failing in her duty to Lucy and her parents? Do you think she is?
- 10. Lucy tells her father that she will quit the college play, but she doesn't. Was she lying to him when she made the promise? Was she lying to herself?
- 11. Lucy's father calls her "moderately talented" (page 255). Why does that feel to her like a slap in the face?
- 12. Love, Lucy is loosely based on A Room with a View—a novel by E. M. Forster that was made into a popular film. If you can, read the original novel or view the movie. Discuss what's common to each version. Explore what's different.
- 13. A picture taken by Charlene of Lucy kissing Jesse appears in the popular guidebook *Wanderlust*. Why does Lucy feel betrayed by Charlene? Why does Charlene feel betrayed by the writer of the guidebook? Would you be?
- 14. "You're like a dream boyfriend," Lucy tells Shane.
 "I think maybe I don't deserve you" (Page 259-260).
 Do you agree? Why is Shane such an appealing guy?
 Why doesn't Lucy treat him better?
- 15. Lucy has several hard decisions to make over the course of this novel. How does she arrive at those decisions? How well does she balance her heart and her head?
- 16. "You have no idea what it feels like not to get every single thing you want," Charlene says to Lucy (page 94). Is Charlene being mean, as Lucy thinks? Or is she being truthful, as she claims? Does Lucy always get what she wants?
- 17. Love, Lucy ends the summer after Lucy's freshman year in college. Try to imagine what her life will be like in 10 years. Will she still be with Jesse? Where does she live? What career is she pursuing?




